

Interview with AROHE's Executive Director

As AROHE's Executive Director since 2005, Janette Brown has been asked many questions from AROHE members or burgeoning campus organizations regarding the ins and outs of beginning or enhancing an existing retiree group. I thought it was time to turn the tables and ask her what she asks potential or current AROHE members. Here are some of her questions that might help you to guide others to AROHE's valuable resources.

- **1.** Does your institution recognize that retirees from your campus represent an important untapped resource?
- **2.** How do you engage your experienced retired faculty and staff in campus service, support, and learning?
- **3.** If you and your campus are already connecting with campus retirees, how are you working to improve and develop your connections?
- **4.** Do you know that a network of campus and retiree leaders involved with retirement organizations in higher education already exists?
- **5.** Are you using the AROHE resources: conference presentations, AROHE survey results, and other retiree organizations' best practices and models to adapt for your campus?
- **6.** Do you know what other institutions are doing to secure campus support for their retiree organizations?
- **7.** Do you know where you can go to learn about the latest trends in higher education regarding retiree transitions, engagement, and service?
- **8.** Would you like to obtain information and consulting support on how to create and develop a retiree organization on your college/university campus?

9. Would you like to participate in a network of institutions that provide ideas and best practices to develop your campus retiree organization and make it more successful?

Janette is always enthusiastic about and up-to-date on the latest trends. She has no qualms in stating, "AROHE is the ONLY non-profit association dedicated to helping institutions of higher education to create and develop campus retiree organizations. It is the place to go for innovative resources, research, support, and networking. We are a volunteer network of committed retiree and campus leaders who recognize the value retirees can bring to their institutions; we acknowledge the importance of tapping into the experience, talent, and knowledge of retired faculty and staff for the benefit of our campus communities."

AROHE Visits Columbia University

In October, Janette Brown visited with AROHE members from EPIC (Emeritus Professors in Columbia).

Professors Emeritus, Robert Belknap (EPIC President), Seymour Topping (Director, University Seminars, Society of Senior Scholars), and Ene Sirvet (editor of the Papers of John Jay and EPIC Secretary) hosted a lunch meeting at the Faculty House to share ideas for securing the Provost's support for university retirees. Janette shared ideas from AROHE members as well as strategies that have been useful at the University of Southern California where an Emeriti Center was established in 1978 for all retired faculty and staff. In turn, EPIC shared information on a 2005 emeriti organization survey commissioned by Seymour Topping.

AROHE's Strategic Vision Working Group

In April 2011, your AROHE Executive Committee plus two AROHE committee chairs flew or drove in from our various states and cities for a two-day work meeting in Los Angeles. AROHE Treasurer, Bob Coffey,

SUNY Retiree Volunteers

A Priceless Resource for SUNY Campuses

Ram Chugh, Ph.D., Executive Director, SUNY Retirees Service Corps, Distinguished Service Professor Emeritus of Economics and AROHE board member, has been engaged in a monumental effort over the last year. The result of those efforts is contained in a report subtitled "An Analysis of Responses to the Survey on State University of New York (SUNY) Retirees Volunteer Activity" which was produced by the SUNY Retirees Service Corps (RSC). AROHE congratulates Ram and the RSC for producing a valuable resource that documents the amazing volunteerism that we all know occurs within our institutions.

Six hundred and three (603) retiree colleagues completed the volunteerism survey electronically in July 2010. The subsequent report yielded surprising results of great value to SUNY campuses, local communities, and retirees themselves.

The survey showed a significant number of respondents were engaged in volunteer service since retiring from SUNY. "The taxpayers have supported me for more than thirty years," one retiree explained, "and it is only fair that I use the skills, contacts and knowledge I have built during my service to the university to keep serving the public interest during my remaining years." Many more respondents were willing to share their time and talents to help meet campus and community service needs, if asked. "Retirees have a great deal to offer—develop programs to utilize their talents for the greater good of the public and for the retirees themselves," stated another respondent.

However, the survey findings suggest that only a small percentage of SUNY campuses are engaging their retirees as volunteers.

The report also contains respondents' recommendations for enhancing their retirement experience. Most of them wanted to remain connected with their former campuses and colleagues. "Campuses should communicate with retirees on a regular basis," wrote one retiree, "and offer programs and activities which encourage retirees to remain involved as members of [the] college community." Another urged the SUNY Retirees Service Corps to "Help maintain links to former colleagues."

Based on retiree recommendations, the report proposes an action plan to increase retiree involvement in voluntary activities. The report suggests that if, "Campuses and the SUNY RSC can take the simple, cost effective steps contained within the action plan to strengthen connections with our retirees and encourage their involvement in service activities that will benefit everyone involved - campuses, communities, and especially SUNY retirees themselves."

The findings of the study will be featured at the RSC's second biennial conference to be held November 3, 2011 at SUNY Plaza in Albany, appropriately titled, "The Power of SUNY Retirees."

'Keeping Up' with the CURAC Conference

On May 11- 14, 2011, AROHE president Bobbie Lubker attended the 9th annual national conference of College & University Retirement Associations of Canada (CURAC /ARUCC). ARUCC is the French acronym for this organization whose newsletter is published in both French and English. CURAC/ARUCC met at the University of Regina in Regina, Saskatchewan. The conference theme was "Keeping Up."

Lubker stated four primary purposes for her participation in the CURAC conference:

- 1. To build bridges with our next door neighbors;
- 2. To identify similarities and differences in AROHE and CURAC needs, philosophies, approaches, and operation;
- 3. To explore the idea of expanding international memberships; and
- 4. To welcome CURAC's continuing participation in AROHE activities.

According to Lubker, the CURAC/ARUCC conference program was a well-balanced blend across impressive historic and scholarly presentations, best practices sessions (e.g. electronic communication in retiree associations), and topics relevant to retirement living and planning (e.g., the aging brain, Medicare changes and pensions).

CURAC's Regina Conference took place at the University of Regina in Saskatchewan, Canada

In a brief invited presentation, Lubker spoke on "Our Canadian Cousins and AROHE". She reported on AROHE emphases such as best practices, international memberships, bylaws revisions, recruitment, new membership models, and the 2012 conference.

Lubker stated, "I observe that Canadians in higher education use the words "college" and "university" in some ways different from the usages in the US where these identifiers have more restricted meaning. These differences may represent differences in philosophies; however, I think these lexicon differences matter not at all in the similar goals and wishes CURAC and AROHE have for retirees from the academy."

Several conference participants commented on pleasant memories of Janette Brown and Barry Culhane's presentations at an earlier CURAC conference. Follow-up emails from Canadians expressed interest in AROHE's early thinking about increasing international contacts with particular emphasis on the United Kingdom.

In summary, Lubker said, "I had visited universities on the eastern and western edges of this vast country, but the high winds of the Canadian prairie and the warm welcome by the University of Regina and CURAC/ARUCC to me and the spirit of my presentation took my breath away."

- developing and managing a Friendship Committee which contacts members needing a helping hand and sending an ARF sympathy note to families of deceased members
- * FSU retired faculty & staff were credited with having donated \$45 million dollars during the previous five-year University Capital Campaign.

* ARF members support three volunteer scholarship programs: the Bernard F. Sliger Scholarship (FSU President and founder of ARF (1979), The Southern Scholarship Foundation, and an ARF Scholarship.

ACE: Faculty Retirement Transitions Panel Presentation



Patrick Cullinane, Director of the UC Berkeley Retirement Center and AROHE board member, was asked to be a panelist at the July 10-12, 2011, invitational conference of the American Council on Education. The panel addressed the "Nuts and Bolts of Faculty Retirement Transitions: Before, During and After." Conference participants were from research universities, liberal arts schools and regional educational systems concerned with faculty retirement and institutional responses.

Mr. Cullinane shared information about Berkeley's pre-retirement planning program, initiatives with the vice provost for academic affairs and faculty welfare that assist deans and department chairs with faculty transitions and that succinctly inform faculty of options and resources for their next chapter of life.

In addition, information was shared from the Center's recent survey of retired faculty and from the ongoing, international AROHE survey.
