What did we learn from the AROHE services survey?

Thank you to everyone who completed the AROHE services survey. Congratulations to Professor Emeritus Lynn Hogue, from the [Georgia State University Emeriti Association](#), whose name was drawn from those who participated; Lynn won an Amazon gift card.

The AROHE board conducted this survey to investigate the greatest challenges faced by retiree organizations and to ask about services AROHE can provide to meet AROHE member needs.

Survey results will be used to help shape AROHE's strategic plan for the next two years. The AROHE board will finalize the plan and publish a summary in the May issue of the *AROHE Matters* e-newsletter.

Key findings:

- The three greatest challenges facing retiree organizations are attracting younger retirees, recruiting new members and recruiting board members and volunteers;
- The most valuable of AROHE's services is networking with AROHE members;
- The most valuable services AROHE can add are regular email updates, an online member directory and member listserves or discussion groups;
- The most common ongoing retiree benefits are use of the campus library, use of campus email and retiree health care or stipends;
- The most common retiree program offerings are social events, email updates/listserves and community presentations.


