

Retired faculty and staff give back to university through REV-UP program

REV-UP (Retired Employee Volunteers-University Program) is a unique University of Buffalo (UB) program through which retired faculty and staff remain connected to the university while carrying out worthwhile activities on the campus. A collaborative program of the UB Emeritus Center and the Human Resources Department, REV-UP connects retirees with short-term and ongoing assignments in more than 30 departments. Research indicates retirees experience greater satisfaction if they remain involved in activities that allow them to use their skills, face new challenges, and include structure in their lives. REV-UP is an excellent example of a mutually-beneficial program which provides meaningful opportunities for retirees while helping UB pursue its goals and further its mission. 
