The Emeriti Association at the University of Cincinnati had been inactive for about a year when a new Board of Directors took the helm last spring and made great strides in garnering support from the university and increasing connections. In advocating for funding support, the board found success by emphasizing the amount of donations made by emeriti to the university each year and by showing their willingness to contribute in a variety of ways, including proposing a uniform process for granting emeritus status, consulting, serving on committees and mentoring students. In January 2014, they were awarded funding.
