

Member Profile: New Campus Center for Rutgers Retired Faculty and Staff

On February 28 the Rutgers Retired Faculty and Staff Center (RRFSC), created for the men and women who have dedicated their careers to building the university and who want to continue serving it, officially opened. The inviting space features a conference table, computer stations and desk with a full-time staff person.

The center is the most visible element of the new university-wide Retired Faculty and Staff Association (RFSA), an umbrella organization for existing retiree groups. The RFSA aims to connect retiree volunteers to

opportunities within the university, to inform retirees of events and programs, to issue a monthly newsletter, and to provide other services.

An advisory group appointed by former university president Richard L.

McCormick oversaw the design and planned usage. The center was built with funds provided jointly by the university and a donation from Todd Hunt, retired acting dean of Rutgers' School of Communication and Information who had three decades of service. Gustav Friedrich, professor and dean emeritus at the School of Communication and Information, chaired the advisory group. "Our charge was to create a broad umbrella group that includes all campuses and creates synergy by focusing on what Rutgers can do for retirees and what retirees can do for Rutgers," says Friedrich, who in his retirement is volunteering as a docent at the Zimmerli Art Museum. "Retired folks receive benefits from the university - for example, access to the library system, parking, etc. - and the university receives benefits from retired folks, such as volunteer activities and donations."

The new facility gathers several groups under one roof. They include the <u>Silver</u> <u>Knights</u>, which serves some 2,500 retired staff members throughout the country, the <u>Retired Faculty Association</u>, formed in 1999; and the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School Retired Faculty Association. Other units of Rutgers, including the School of Environmental and Biological Sciences and the Rutgers Camden, also have active retiree groups that are expected to take advantage of the center.

The center is housed on the first floor of the Administrative Services Building II (ASBII) on Route 1 in New Brunswick. A <u>website dedicated to retirees</u> is being expanded. Vivian Fernandez, university vice president for faculty and staff resources, has assumed responsibility for the RFSA and the new facility.

The <u>University of California, Davis Emeriti Association</u> (UCDEA) Executive Committee is concluding its first year of a successful new program called "Coffee with Campus Leaders." The program is a simple one. Each month, for the hour before its regular monthly meeting, the executive committee invites a



member of the current campus leadership to have coffee and informal conversation with them.

These sessions are intended to be opportunities for the emeriti association leadership to get current, first-hand accounts of developments on campus. At the same time, an important benefit is that these coffee get-togethers serve to heighten the campus leaderships' awareness of the emeriti association. The committee feels that the sessions have been so successful that they will be continued for the future.

The UCDEA president polls the executive committee to determine which campus leaders to invite and issues the invitations. Recently, the vice chancellor for research spoke about the challenges and opportunities in securing support for research. In the previous month, the university librarian talked about the future functions and purposes of the new research library. Invited by the Ministry of Education in Taiwan, AROHE Executive Director, Janette Brown, was a keynote speaker for the 2014 International Conference of Elder Education and Intergenerational Learning in Taipei. Held in March, the event was hosted by the Department of Adult and Continuing Education at National Chung Cheng University (NCCU).

Brown's speech on "The utilization and re-education of retired faculty and staff at universities" presented AROHE survey data on what North American universities do for their retired faculty and staff. Mike Stover, President of the Osher Lifelong Learning Center at California State University, Fullerton, who also spoke at the Taiwan Conference, will be presenting at the August 2014 AROHE Conference.
