

Continuing Activities of Professors Emeriti(ae)

Emeritus faculty remain engaged in a variety of activities that are pertinent to the University's values. The following are some examples:

Within the University: They

1. Write scholarly and scientific papers and books, position papers, and papers on their ongoing research
2. Continue to do research and many continue to receive grants
3. Engage in collaborative research with colleagues and research associates world-wide
4. Write books about the evolution of their discipline and departments
5. Supervise PhD students and often sit on PhD committees even if they are not supervising the student
6. Supervise or Co-supervise post-doctoral fellows
7. Sit on UBC committees of all types: President's Advisory Committee on Campus Enhancement, President's Advisory Committee on major awards, the Faculty and Staff Development Fund, the UBC Alumni Awards Committee, the UBC Alumni Building Committee, Ethics of Research committees, etc., etc.
8. Sit on department committees of a broad range
9. Mentor both faculty and trainees at all levels
10. Chair PhD examinations for the Faculty of Graduate Studies
11. Continue to serve the university in different administrative roles (for example, they are available to fill in and do locums administratively). Some get "recalled", and serve as acting Principals/Directors of St John's College and the Peter Wall Institute for Advanced Studies
12. Engage actively in different interdisciplinary forums (e.g., Graduate Colleges, Institutes) to promote interdisciplinary scholarship.

Activities External to UBC: These are not UBC based, but bring prestige to UBC

13. Engage in public education through continuing education talks, workshops, articles in newspapers, magazines
14. Speak and conduct workshops at scientific and professional meetings
15. Organize scientific and professional meetings
16. Review for granting agencies and scholarly journals
17. Accept invitations as Visiting Professors/ senior scholars/ Adjunct Professors to provide consultation in various capacities to faculty members and administrators -- e.g., setting up research programs, strengthening graduate programs
18. Accept invitations to write articles, book chapters, that bring an historical perspective to their discipline and/or a particular substantive area
19. Serve as external examiners for PhD candidates in other universities

20. Serve as reviewers for tenure and promotion in other universities
21. Serve as executives with their professional groups
22. Serve as editors, and on editorial boards, for professional journals
23. Provide mentorship within the national and international community
24. Serve on F/T/P government committees and commissions
25. Serve as advisors/consultants to global NGOs
